Introduction:

Yesterday, Thanoshi and me went to a PD. The staffs in the Ricketts Point Marine Sanctuary showed us how to set up activity tables about marine creatures. We think we can use the activities in our centre.

They also told us some fun facts:

- 1. How do the birds eat sea urchin? The birds will hold them high up and drop them on hard rocks, so the sea urchin will crack open.
- 2. When sea stars (we are not allowed to call them star fish anymore, as they are not fish) are hungry and they can't find food, they will eat their own legs..... and the leg will grow again later. If a sea star feels lonely, it can split itself in half and play with its 'new friend'.
- 3. There are paper made of rocks! Kmart is selling them. The production cost is 40% less than using trees!
- 4. There are companies that using coffee waste to make T-shirt! 1 cup of coffee can make 2 T-shirt, and 3 cups of coffee plus 12 bottles can make a jacket!
- 5. There is a kind of spider web stronger than steel and titanium! So some companies are trying to use spider web to make tools for medical use!

Reflections:

Attending that session on marine conservation was really interesting. It made us see just how important it is to leave the ocean exactly as we find it. The facilitators made such a strong case about why we shouldn't take things out of the sea. They're not just souvenirs, right? They're part of an ecosystem, and everything in the ocean has its own place and purpose. It was a powerful reminder that we need to think twice before disturbing that balance.

And then there was this whole part about recycling and using plastic responsibly. It's something we hear about all the time, but the way they explained it, how we can actually minimise plastic waste and make sure we're disposing of it correctly, it just clicked. It's not just about us; it's about setting an example for the kids, showing them how to be environmentally responsible from a young age.

The activities we got to do were the best part. We learned how to bring the concept of sea animals into our teaching in a really fun way. It wasn't just about telling the kids; it was about engaging them, making it interactive. I've got some photos of what we did; I'll attach them for you all to have a look. It's one thing to talk about marine education, but it's another to see it in action, making it accessible and enjoyable for the little ones.

Oh, and I had this moment of realisation about starfish, or should I say, sea stars. I've always called them starfish, but turns out, that's not really accurate. They're not fish at all. They don't have brains or scales, and they don't swim. So, "sea star" is the term we should be using. It's fascinating how a simple name change can make you rethink what you know about these creatures.

It was a lot to take in, but I came away from it feeling really inspired to make a difference, even in small ways, both in how I teach and how I live.

They also handed out a sheet detailing how many years various items take to decompose in the sea. Honestly, it's quite shocking to see the numbers, these items takes so many years! We were all surprised.


